Looking back looking forward

It's been two years since I began working on the Creative Places West Cork Islands (CPWCI) project. There was no template for this role, as regional support for the arts was a new idea being developed by the The Arts Council / An Chomhairle Ealaíon and supported nationally via the local authorities - we have in many ways been breaking new ground. It became clear from the outset that the job was to invite people to initiate projects, and for me to create the structures to make the projects happen. With the support of the project partnership, we are creating a funding mechanism that is future proofed and adaptable to the unique needs of the islands.

Funding for year four of the project has still to be secured and is dependent on the merits of this phase of the programme. I have been heartened by the commitment of sections of the community and the projects activated across the islands have given me confidence that we, as a creative community, can continue the work.

The first two years of the project have seen us deliver support for long standing festivals within the region such as the West Cork Music suite of festivals, Open Ear (islanders' night) and some new ones too such as Bobstock, the first Bere Island Festival and the Festival of Music on Heir Island. Our Islander Artist programme supported work by Simon Kidd, Kirstie Affleck, Mary Sullivan, Norman King, Mona O' Driscoll, and Fergus Murphy. Islanders were also supported through *Try It Series* initiated by Cally at the Sherkin library, these include, Eoin Marshall, Nigel Towse, workshops by Madeleine Dunne, and others.

Some project highlights have included Pauline Hanley's Bere Island International Poetry Prize and Stephen Carter's Leatherwork for Islanders, the music meetings on Oileán Chléire, Sherkin and Heir Islands organised by Neisha Azzopardi. Thanks to Nuala Mahon for her photography work. I was also very impressed with the Oileán Chléire ceramic throw down managed by Catherine Ryan and the achievements of the men's shed on Bere Island. Much appreciation also to Jesse Jones & Nkosi: The Moth Catchers on Sherkin was a beautiful initiative. I have also worked more closely this year with Fiona from the Sherkin Island Development Society and Oscar from Bere Island Projects Group, both have initiated a lot of new and exciting projects. And of course in 2024 we hosted the National Creative Places Network with Damien McGlvnn from Create (the national development agency for collaborative arts) and

Katie Lowry from the Arts Council. Both organisations supported our work with great energy and vision.

I'm looking forward to working again with Róisín Ní Chonaill on this year's Bobstock on Oileán Chléire and continuing our support to Sherkin's Harmony in Blue singers. In 2025 we will also have an exhibition celebrating our work across the islands, this will be at the LHQ Gallery at Cork County Council. Some works included here will be a selection of objects by Diarmuid O'Driscoll, a film by William Bock, the complete collection of the wooden boat plaques by Sherkin's Nigel Towse and John Simpson, a wall-based work by Kirstie Affleck, and other works that shine a bright light on island life.

In 2025 we will also move forward with our Storytellers in Residence: Paddy O'Brien, Nuala Hayes and Simone Schuemmelfeder. This is a seven-islands project that will explore themes and rhythms through storytelling and composition. We are also now ready to move forward on the Ocean & Environment commission with renowned filmmaker Eóin Heaney who will create a new artwork that truly defines the islands under the Ocean & Environment theme.

What's been happening with the Creative Places National Network?

The Arts Council's Creative Places programme is a national initiative. The Arts Council in partnership with Cork County Council are the main sponsor of the project enabling our work here on the West Cork Islands. The Creative Places project objective is to cultivate cultural support into places that have been previously overlooked.



In April 2024 the West Cork Islands of Sherkin and Heir facilitated the National Creative Places Network.¹ During the two day event coordinators from all the other locations came to West Cork in what was a fantastic few days of sharing, learning and connecting.



In 2024 we also facilitated Arts Council research through Sarah Boiling and Associates who met with representatives from the islands at locations on Sherkin and Bere Island. This research resulted in a national network-wide report that analysed the good work being done across the country. This report concluded that the West Cork Island's programme would merit continued support beyond the initial three year phase.


The St Anthony

Fielding on Dursey Island

The following poem was written by acclaimed Irish Poet Annemarie Ní Churreáin during her Residency on Dursey Island in early 2024

Then, after a torn night, I'm tearing uphill along the lit side of the island, in heavy wools and laced boots, the ice of January in my throat. Mart is there with the gate held open. And in I go to see the calf, birth-wet and right where it landed - legless but alert, the ears pricked up inside a thin rain-coat of slime and gazing around at grassgrassgrass as if to wonder Where am I now? The air is thin as water over the temple rocks. I have missed the calving by a breath, missed what I imagined might take hours of standing around, looking, probing. Would I need to help? What to name the calf? And would my camera last to capture everything in real time? Now, the cow swings her oblong head into my path, eyes bright as fire, fielding me in her glare, with all the dark knowledge of what humans are and what they do. The calf is beginning to wobble up to the surface of its new life, moon and bones. Where am I now? I'm in shock. Or love? Mart ushers me back outside the gate. Come now, let's leave them alone. Everything is as it should be.

The inaugural poetry competition run by Bere Island Creative Writing Retreats was won by Fiona Hanley with her poem **Gobnait Leaves the Mainland**. Second place was awarded to Michael Dooley and third place to Faye Boland. Judged by Enda Wyley, the competition had over 100 entries from Ireland and beyond. All entries had to have the word island in the title or body of the poem. The winning entries were read by the poets during the Bere Island Arts Festival at the wonderful location of Wild Atlantic Glamping. We are very grateful to Creative Places for funding this wonderful competition .

and wait for a sign, an augury of summoning.


And quivering it comes and iridescent winged

EXPLORING QUESTIONS RELATED TO THE WEST CORK ISLANDS UNDER THE THEME OCEAN & ENVIRONMENT. ONGOING THROUGH 2025 AND 2026

Eóin Heaney is the recipient of the CPWCI Ocean and **Environment Commission.** An acclaimed Irish filmmaker renowned for his evocative storytelling and innovative cinematic techniques.

Eóin's work delves into complex themes such as trauma, identity, and the human condition, reflecting a deep commitment to exploring societal issues through film. He studied film production in Ballyfermot College of Further Education, Dublin and his previous work has been supported by the Arts Council of Ireland, Screen Ireland, Centre Culturel Irlandais in Paris, France and Germany's FFF Bayern and the Berlinale Film Festival.

Eóin directed Foreclosed, an experimental film depicting homes whose previous owners have failed to meet their mortgage payments and thus have been evicted. Now owned by banks, these places bear the marks of ruptured lives and hasty departures highlighting themes of isolation and ambiguity in contemporary suburbia.

Eóin's 2014 hypnotic dance film *Turning* was inspired by the work of Eadweard Muybridge and explored the cyclical nature and repetitive behaviour of contemporary Irish society. This project demonstrated his interest in blending different art forms to convey complex social commentaries.

In 2021, Heaney released the multi-award winning Spirit *Level*, a short film examining the legacy of sectarian violence in Northern Ireland. Using Seamus Heaney's poem Mycenae Lookout as a touchstone, the film explored how cinema can depict, contest, and subvert historical understanding, acknowledging the powerful capacity of film to influence public discourse about the past.

His 2024 experimental film *M/S* delved into the representation of illness and the radical possibilities of love, care, and dying on one's own terms. Drawing from his seventeen years of experience as the primary carer for his mother, Susan Heaney, who suffers from multiple sclerosis, the film was co-authored with her, offering an intimate portrayal of their shared journey.

In the same year, Heaney premiered Parish, a hybrid documentary that examines the representation of community identity. The film follows a communal choreography, presenting a cinematic moveable feast where a diverse group of people add colour, nuance, and shape to their community identity through the vivid, visceral nature of memory and its connection to dramatic experience.

Throughout his career, Eóin Heaney has consistently demonstrated a profound commitment to exploring intricate human experiences and societal issues, solidifying his place as a significant voice in contemporary Irish cinema.



THE STORYTELLERS IN RESIDENCE. EXPLORING THEMES AND RHYTHMS THROUGH ORAL STORYTELLING AND COMPOSITION ACROSS THE SEVEN WEST CORK ISLANDS.

Es war einmal ... Fadó, Fadó ... SIMONE SCHUEMMELFEDER

Living in Germany, I grew up with fairy tales, especially the ones collected by the Brothers Grimm. There was a certain thrill to listening to those tales and knowing that they had been collected in the area I was born in – Weserbergland, the Weser-Mountain-Area in the middle of Germany. The town I was born in, Höxter, claims to be the "Hänsel and Gretel Town", which added excitement and quiet terror to our Sunday family walks in the woods. I was expecting to stumble across the remains of the well-known gingerbread house in every thicket we passed. We never did find it, but my father kept telling us that we must have been very close. Snow White and Sleeping Beauty were supposed to have lived not far from us and then there is Hameln up the river, famous for its tragic role in the legend of the Pied Piper.

It never occurred to me to use my love for stories to make a living, until I came to Ireland. As the apprentice of Irish

storyteller Liz Weir, a new world of stories opened up to me. I enjoyed delving into the wealth of Irish stories. Becoming a storyteller myself, I researched, listened to and told many new stories and it made me look at the folklore of my country again with a different perspective. For example, I was told that the hawthorn tree holds a special place in Irish culture as the Fairy Tree, which is never supposed to be cut down if you do not want to lose your life, and even breaking a branch of it may result in a broken limb. I was amazed at this and wondered if there was something similar in German stories. While not many people in German might remember now, there is a tree that was regarded with similar respect, and that is the Elderberry tree. It is connected to "Mother Holle" (another tale collected by the Brothers Grimm and another name of "Berchta" or "Percht", a fierce and beautiful figure of Germanic mythology). Elderberry trees were planted around the house for protection and if the family had to flee, they would bury their most precious possessions under the tree to find again when they returned. This is only one example of how my exploration of other culture's stories has brought me back to the stories of my childhood. In my work as a storyteller, I look for these connections we make through stories. I am looking forward to making many more connections through the stories we will hear and tell on the seven islands this year.



Siúlach Scéalach Stories Travel NUALA HAYES

The story was not born with Robbie Fox Nor with his father Nor his father's father But farther back than any could remember

Cox told the story Over twelve nights at Christmas It was the story Made Christmas real When it was done The new year was in Made authentic by the story The old year was dead Buried by the story The man endured Deepened by the story....

The above words are extracted from Brendan Kennelly's poem *The Story*.

They are in fact an elegy for the loss of the story and the storyteller and I heard them for the first time, recited by Brendan at a celebration on the Late Late Show for Eamon Kelly the actor and seanchaí. Eamon, who died aged 87 in October 2001, was hugely popular in Ireland. For many people he was the embodiment of the seanchaí, the storyteller of the past in Ireland. I was in the company of my father Micheál OhAodha, who was a radio producer and was the person who created a space on the air for Eamon on Radio Éireann, as it was in the old days, and so began the popularity of the genial Kerryman who began his stories with "In my father's time... ".

My father was fond of saying "never let the truth get in the way of a good story" and he also described Eamon's use of words to quote himself, as 'captured in lazy flight from Irish to English '.

A seed must have been planted in my head at that time because now, many years later I find myself in a world where stories and words are still in flight and sometimes land in the heads of people who love to listen and share them. In the last 25 years the search for stories has brought me to many places in the world, from Australia to Canada, to festivals across Europe, to the small island of Kea in Greece, to Vesterbotten in Northern Sweden along with millions of mosquitoes and last year to Scotland with the stories of Peig Sayers.

In 2005, I spent almost a year on Oileáin Chléire recording the stories, poems and prayers of the older people of the island, which resulted in *Bóithrín na Smaointe*, a miscellany of Cape Clear Memories, with photographs by John Minahan. Most of those wonderful people who shared their experiences have now passed, but their memories and images live on.



This drew me to the project with Creative Places. Stories and storytelling connects people and places. That delicate thread which connects the past to the present and which finds new life in shared stories is what draws me in and I look forward with joy and anticipation to meeting and sharing with the people on the seven islands of West Cork.

The Red Scarf PADDY O'BRIEN

Dennis O'Connor, that's Dinny Jim Dan A young man from old Dingle town. At football or fishing he was the man At both he'd won fame and renown.

When fishing at sea he felt wild and free At football he'd yet to be bet And all were agreed that with skill and with speed He'd put ball or big fish in the net

At a dance in The Grove he met Mary O'Shea And he knew from the moment they met That this beautiful girl had his mind in a whirl And his heart was entwined in her net

All around his home place it was plain from his face That Dennis was smitten for life. And the people would say that Mary O'Shea Would make him a gorgeous young wife.
